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


Nearly **6.5 million** became internally displaced *IOM-March* 2022

As of May 2, the total amount of direct documented infrastructure damages, based only on public sources, is almost \$92 billion or over UAH 2.7 trillion.

As estimated by the Ministry of Economy and Kyiv School of Economics (KSE), the **overall Ukraine's economic losses** due to the war, taking into account both direct losses calculated in this project and indirect losses (GDP decline, investment cessation, outflow of labor, additional defense and social support costs, etc), range from \$564 billion **to \$600 billion**.

3. EFFECTS OF WAR ON GLOBAL FOOD SYSTEM


World has already faced the first signs of global food crisis as a result of war in Ukraine

- As a result of war in Ukraine the prices for food wheat have jumped to \$470-500 per ton
- Ukraine feeds 400 million people in Africa and the Middle East. The civil unrests and "hunger" riots can be spread in the region because of shortage of Ukrainian grain
- Prices for energy, fuel and feeds are hitting global farming and agriculture
- European dairy and meat farmers are short of fodder crops imported from Ukraine

- 10 out of 24 regions have been or still are under temporarily occupation or in hostilities zone
- Harvest 2022 is under threat due to shortage of seeds, fertilizers, crop protection products, diesel, mining of fields
- russian invaders make targeted attacks on the oil depots across the country
- Exports through the Black Sea and the Azov Sea ports are blocked
- Logistics and supply chains of agri-inputs are broken
- Livestock sector suffer from shortage of feeds and veterinarian medicines as well as milk sales channels
- Farms and farm machinery are under regular shelling and attacks



4. EFFECTS OF WAR ON MILK & SUPPLIES TO CIVILIANS



- 10 out of 24 regions being under temporarily occupation or in hostilities zone, supplied 42% of milk for processing
- ~ 800 commercial dairy farms have been affected by the war


Ukraine's dairy farming as of January 1, 2022:

- 2.48 million tons of milk were supplied for processing
- commercial dairy farms account for over 80% in the structure of milk supplied for processing
- the average milk yield in commercial dairy farms amounted to 6,860 kg per cow per year; top farms got 11,000 kg per cow/year
- milk consumption reached 206 kg per capita per year
- key employer in rural area: 80,000 employees of dairy farms and 300,000 employees in related industries

Nevertheless

- Dairy farms in safer regions keep up and even increase milk yields,
- Dairy farms and processing plants in liberated regions gradually recover



Key facts and forecasts for dairy farming

- Since February 24, above 50,000 cows were lost
- According to the optimistic scenario (war duration about 6 month), about 70,000 cows could be lost till the end of the year (16% of the commercial cow herd)
- Under the pessimistic scenario (war duration over 8 month), more than 120,000 cows could be lost till the end of the year (above 30 %)
- This may cause the shortage in milk supply that
 will affect approximately 5 mln people in Ukraine.



- Under the pessimistic scenario (war duration over 8 month), more than 120,000 cows could be lost till the end of the year (above 30%)
- This may cause the shortage in milk supply that
 will affect approximately 5 mln people in Ukraine.




5. EFFECTS OF WAR ON LIVESTOCK: MILK PRODUCTION

Key challenges for dairy farms in hostilities zone:

- Total or partial damage
- Broken supply chains and logistics of agri-inputs
- Lack of working capital and inability to attract loans
- Shortage of protein feeds
- Shortage of labor forces
- Shortage of veterinarian medicines and tools
- Impossibility to harvest forages

Dairy farms keep supporting locals, refugees, hospitals, defenders by

- supplying milk for free
- restoring bakeries, mills, creameries, dairies where that is possible

6. "MARSHALL PLAN" FOR UKRAINIAN LIVESTOCK

Phase 1. Critical

Duration: 3 months

Goals:

- providing critical agri-inputs import to support the crop and livestock industry
- organizing and ensuring the work of
 Logistic center for humanitarian cargoes
- providing humanitarian aid for the Armed
 Forces and the civilian population
- ensuring the humanitarian fuel supplies

Phase 2. Strategic

Duration: 12 months

Goals:

- launching the national center for relieving the consequences of hostilities in the agricultural sector (re-cultivation, demining, legal aid, etc.)
- solving the problem of grain exports by developing extra logistics hubs and launching humanitarian projects at Ukrainian mills
- developing large-scale capacity-building projects for livestock with the support of international donors

6. "MARSHALL PLAN" FOR UKRAINIAN LIVESTOK

Phase 3. Developing

Duration: after the active phase of hostilities

Goals:

- developing the network of Farm Depots centers of competency, employment, providing farmers with needs, contractors service
- launching the laboratory complex for wide range of analysis and researches in agriculture
- developing the national-wide educational projects

Phase 4. Recovery

Duration: after-war period

Goals:

- developing long-term projects with the support of international donors on relief and recovery of Ukraine's agriculture:
 - Ukrainian Agrarian University
- Plant for production of irrigation equipment
 - Cooperative milk processing plant
 - Cooperative slaughter house
 - Network of demo farms



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
